Instructional Learning Choices

<p>Option 1 - Traditional Learning</p>	<p>Back as a NDES Stingrays five days a week! We have missed you! The traditional model will move to digital learning if COVID-19 becomes substantial in the community, building, or classroom.</p> <p>If you select this option, you do not have to do anything if you are already enrolled at NDES</p>
<p>Option 2 - School Based Digital Learning.</p> <p>This requires a 9 week commitment. August 10 - October 7 October 8 - December 18 January 6 - March 10 March 11 - May 26</p> <p>Once COVID-19 is no longer a crisis, this option will phase out.</p>	<p>This instruction will be provided by NDES teachers! Students must tune into live-instruction for ELA, Math, Science and Social Studies at specified times (see below for an example of how the schedule might look).</p> <p>Daily reading and math fluency practice will be required.</p> <p>Live classes will be 45-60 minutes in length. Independent assignments will also be given for all content areas in addition to PE/Health.</p> <p>ESOL, gifted, special education and speech services will be provided, but more details will follow once we have more information about registration.</p> <p>Here is an EXAMPLE of what a schedule COULD look like: 7:40am - 8:25am Science/social studies 9:00 - 9:45 - ESOL/ELL services 10:00am - 10:45am Math 11:15am - 12:00pm Reading/ELA 1:40pm - 2:25pm PE/Health</p> <p>Once parents see their child's class schedule, they can determine when they let their child have lunch at home and when they schedule their child's recess/etc. If students need help from their teachers, they will be able to get help during their regular scheduled time in class (just like they would if they were sitting in the classroom at school.)</p> <p>As we approach each 9 week period, someone from the school will contact the SBDL families to see if they wish to continue with the SBDL model or return to traditional learning.</p>
<p>Option 3 - FLEX Academy</p> <p>This option is a year long commitment. August 10 - May 26</p> <p>This option will not phase out and is a new program offered in Douglas County.</p>	<p>The Douglas County School System will offer an online learning option for students in grades K-12 for families who desire for their child to learn at home. This option will not be taught by North Douglas Elementary teachers and the FLEX academy has its own principal, Dr. Tara Campbell. This is a year long commitment and your child will be taught by a staff of FLEX academy teachers who only do digital teaching. Your Questions	Responses from Principal Kelly
Will ASP be offered for those that select traditional learning?	Yes, the registration fee is \$10.00 and it is a prepaid program that is \$8.00 per day. Please keep in mind that this is a pre-paid program which means you pay before you stay. The hours for ASP are 2:40 - 6:00 for traditional students. Students must be picked up by 6:00 or additional fees apply. Remember again, this is a PRE-PAID Program Only. Register for the ASP Program using this link: ASP Registration
Can I come take pictures of my child on the first day of school?	We are sorry, but visitors will not be allowed in the building. Photographs will need to take place at Sneak-a-Peek or at home prior to coming to school on the first day. Check our pinterest to find some fun and creative ways to get the first day of school photo at home.
Will students that select the traditional model have recess?	Yes, students will have recess. It will look different than it has in the past. At NDES, we plan to have a rotation schedule to include the playground, the math courtyard and open areas around the school. We want our students to be able to get outside, play, and socialize.
How will meals be served to those that select the traditional model?	<p>At this time, students will wash their hands prior to leaving the room in a line to go to the lunchroom. Markings are on the floor to have students remain 6 feet apart while in the cafeteria serving line receiving food.</p> <p>It is highly recommended that payments be made using School Cafe.</p> <p>Once students get their food, they will go back to the classroom to sit in their desk to eat. This will allow for more distance between students than if they were sitting in the lunchroom.</p> <p>Students will go to the cafeteria to get their meals at this time and then go back to their classrooms to eat. Some of the food choices students will have when they go through the line include:</p> <p>Breakfast: breakfast biscuit, cereal, steak biscuit, french toast sticks, blueberry pancakes, sausage biscuit, chicken biscuit, breakfast pizza, pancake on a stick</p> <p>Lunch: chicken sandwich, PB&J sandwich, hot dog, breaded ravioli, taco salad, quinoa bowl, cheeseburger, hamburger, stuffed crust pizza, BBQ sandwich, chicken tenders, turkey/cheese subs, mini corn dogs, popcorn chicken</p> <p>Other items include: yogurt cups, fruit, tater tots, baked beans, corn, salad, green beans, carrots etc.</p> <p>The food mentioned above are just examples. Items will be individually wrapped or put in individual bowls. Items will be put in a sack for students to carry back to the classroom. All food will be covered.</p> <p>Large trash bags will be given to teachers and after students eat in the classroom, their trash will be collected and discarded in large trash cans located on each main hall.</p>
Do students have to wear masks if they attend through the traditional model?	As of 7-8-2020 - Masks are highly recommended, but not required. We do ask that students wear masks in common areas such as in the office, the hallways, or when walking to the cafeteria/restroom. While in the classroom, students have the choice to wear their masks or not wear their masks. If students do elect to wear their masks in class, they can pull their mask down while in the classroom at their individual desk. Parents, please let your child know your expectations of masks while they are in the classroom. Our teachers can not mandate the wearing of masks by your child.
Is staff required to wear masks?	Staff is required to wear masks in all areas of the building. Teachers will be required to remain 6 feet or more in front of their class when delivering instruction. They can remove their masks to deliver instruction so students can hear them better, but they will remain 6 feet or more away from students. Staff also has shields to wear.
What is the supply list for students that are going to return through the traditional model?	The supply list will be on the school website, we will not be allowed to share school supplies
Will students be tested for COVID?	<p>We can not require students to be tested. If someone is tested and confirmed positive we have protocols in place.</p> <p>**Please keep in mind that although you are not required to take your child to the doctor or to be tested for COVID, students should be fever/symptom free with no medication for at least 24 hours before returning to school. In addition, our school nurse will work closely with any individual who has tested positive.</p>
Will students share supplies when they return to in-person learning?	No, we do ask that all students have their own personal supplies. In the past we've been able to share supplies in a community setting, but this coming up school year students must have their own personal items.

	<p>This year, students will put their bookbags on the back of their own chair and if they move classes, they take their bookbag with them. This is also how they will take care of their own coats. This will be the students' responsibility to keep up with their own personal items. If students move to different classrooms for instruction, the desk and chair they sit in will be sanitized between each use.</p> <p>This year the school will be providing each child with their own Chromebook to be used in class and in the event we go out for complete digital learning.</p> <p>As a whole school, we will have a wish list for parents who would like to make additional donations which will be greatly appreciated, but not required.</p>
Will students be using coat racks for bookbags and coats?	No, students will put their bookbags on the back of their own chair and if they move classes, they will take their bookbag with them. This is also how they will take care of their own coats. This will be the students' responsibility to keep up with their own personal items. If students move to different classrooms for instruction, the desk and chair they sit in will be sanitized between each use.
How will the students practice social distancing in the classroom with one another?	Depending on how many students return to school, we will do the best we can; however, with small students, social distancing is very difficult and almost impossible in classrooms. We know parents want to hear that students will be 6 foot apart, but that is not possible. We require students to wear masks outside of their classroom and when they are in their classroom if they are at their individual desk, they can slide their mask down..
Are there plastic shields between desks?	No, we will not have plastic shields between desks. We will have an individual desk for each student, but we will not install plastic shields at this time.
Will we have a "Sneak-a-Peek" this year?	<p>At NDES, we are going to have a staggered Sneak-a-Peek. Sneak-a-Peek will be scheduled during the week of August 3rd. We will release the specific days and times later in July.</p> <p>Sneak-a-Peek will only be for our kindergarten students and students who are NEW to NDES. If you are returning to NDES, we are sorry, but you will not have an in-person sneak-a-peek. Your teacher will have a google meeting as well as post a pre-recorded video on their website for you to meet them and staff will be in the hall to help your child get to the correct classroom the first week of school. We do know that this is very different from how things have been in the past and we appreciate your understanding and support.</p> <p>We know many of you will want to know how to take care of paying for breakfast/lunch, registering for ASP, what supplies your child needs or knowing your child's bus number as well as pick up time and drop off time. Teachers will contact families once they return to let you know homeroom assignments.</p> <p>Here are some of the links you will need so you can do everything on-line. How will we know who our homeroom teacher will be?	When teachers return on July 29th, they will be given their homeroom lists and will begin contacting families.
Will the attendance policy change?	The policy will not change. The GADOE has guidelines. The goal is to be flexible. We are going to work with families and we understand safety comes first. An accurate attendance count will take place for both traditional and School Based Digital Learning (SBDL). School starts at 7:40 this year for all students.
How are classrooms/schools/buses cleaned?	<p>Teachers, students, and custodians will have to help with the cleaning. This will be a community effort.</p> <p>Transportation uses a product called Halt, which is a disinfectant and is widely used on a national level to clean and sanitize buses. Buses are also being fogged using the same chemical. School facilities are cleaned using Halt as well. This is a hospital grade cleaner and disinfectant and can be used to clean multiple spaces and surfaces.</p>
Will students change classes?	<p>Right now, we are planning on changing classes in 3rd, 4th and 5th grades.</p> <p>Third graders will only change classes once, as they will be assigned to two teachers for the year.</p> <p>Our 4th and 5th grade students have switched classes in the past and they will better understand how to pack all of their items up in order to move classes. When students move from one class to another, they will have a personal desk assigned to them and when they move to a new class, the desk and chair will be sanitized prior to the desk/chair being used.</p>

	All students (K-2) will get to transition to Art, Music, STEM and PE. Prior to each new class coming in, the area will be sanitized.
Will there be temperature checks for students and staff?	<p>It is important for parents to keep their kids home if they are not feeling well or if they have a fever. It is important that we all work together as a community. Parents, we do ask that you take the temperature of your child at home. We do not want students traveling on buses or entering the building with temperatures and ask that parents prevent exposing other students and/or faculty by checking before your child ever leaves the home.</p> <p>We have purchased thermometers and a plan is in place to ensure all students and staff are safe.</p> <p>We will have two main entry points into the building for morning arrival. We've been informed that it takes approx. 15 minutes for a body temperature to be regulated after they get off a bus or car. We will be doing random temperature checks throughout the day using an infrared thermometer.</p>
Will water fountains be used?	No, water fountains will be closed and not available. If your child would like water during the day, they will need to bring a clear water bottle to school with their own water.
Will students wash hands?	It will be built into each teacher's schedule for handwashing in the classroom. We will have hand sanitizer available, but hand washing with soap and water is going to be practiced. Prior to students going to lunch, leaving the classroom to go to the restroom, and prior to dismissal, students must wash hands.
Are staff and parents required to report positive COVID test results? What if a positive report is made to the school?	<p>If a student or staff member tests positive, parents will be informed IF their child was in direct contact with the individual that tested positive. Two letters are available for us to send out to inform families:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • 1 letter says your child came in direct contact with an individual who has a positive COVID-19 test result. • 2 letter says your child could have been near an individual who has a positive COVID-19 test result. <p>We will not share who tests positive due to HIPAA and FERPA laws.</p> <p>If you do not get a letter, know that your child was not in direct contact or in the same area with the individual that tested positive.</p> <p>If a staff member or student feels ill, they will be sent home if they are already at school. Although you are not required to take your child to the doctor or to be tested for COVID, students should be fever/symptom free with no medication for at least 24 hours before returning to school. Our school nurses will work with those individuals as well as anyone who has a positive test closely.</p> <p>Students and faculty members who have a temperature or who are sick should NOT report to school. An employee or student who tests positive for COVID or is otherwise required to quarantine may not return to school until they are cleared by the district's head nurse.</p> <p>Students or faculty members who become sick or are experiencing symptoms while at school will be moved to a designated isolation room. The lead nurse and assistant superintendent of student services are informed, along with the superintendent. A footprint investigation is undertaken to identify potential people and areas of infection. The assistant superintendent of operations is made aware and a bioremediation company is contracted to eradicate the virus in the areas identified along with any additional potential areas of contamination.</p> <p>Quarantining specific classes, grade levels, and/or the entire school will be determined by the district and principal based on the footprint investigation. If the quarantining is warranted, whether it is for specific students or the whole school, digitally learning will start immediately for students.</p>
Will visitors be allowed in the building?	No, visitors will be restricted to essential visitors only. If a parent is contacted to pick up their child for any reason, at this time, they will be permitted into the front office. If a parent needs to check out their child for any reason, they will need to call the school and speak to the front office to let them know they are going to come check out their child. They will need to have their ID available and they will be permitted into the front office. Any visitor that comes into the building will be required to have on a mask.
When is breakfast served and how will breakfast be served?	<p>The cafeteria is open 7:00 - 7:30. Students who are in the cafeteria by 7:30 will get breakfast and at this time, they will carry it to their classroom to eat. Breakfast will have to be finished by 7:40 because instruction starts at 7:40. If a student arrives after 7:30, the cafeteria is closed and they will need to go straight to their homeroom. All of our buses will arrive before 7:30, so if your child rides a bus, they will not have a problem getting breakfast.</p> <p>If your child is a car rider, they need to arrive early enough to get into the cafeteria before 7:30 if they want to eat breakfast (please keep in mind this means they need to be in the cafeteria by 7:30, not in</p>

	<p>the car rider line or getting out of their car at 7:30). <i>We do expect the car rider line to be longer this year, so plan to arrive early if you wish for your child to eat breakfast.</i></p>
Are restrooms being monitored and cleaned?	Custodians will be focused on cleaning high touch areas such as door knobs, handles, restrooms, and light switches.
How will schools handle kids who exhibit symptoms?	Processes are in place. At North Douglas, we will have an isolation room for a student to be in as they wait for their parents to pick them up. This will separate them from other students. A path has been created for that facility. The number of nurses across the county will be increased. If a child is sick, they will NOT return to the classroom. The health department has been a part of helping create the protocol for how we take care of sick children.
Will clubs be offered for traditional students?	<p>At NDES, this year our staff will be working to first keep all students safe and second to deliver two different instructional models. They will have to all arrive early in order to receive students into their homerooms at 7:00 and to help assist with a longer dismissal process. They will also have after school meetings, additional prep for instruction, and ongoing training. When we have clubs at the elementary level; those teachers sponsor the clubs without compensation. To help protect the health of our staff, clubs will be limited this year. We will need our teachers to get adequate rest in order to stay as healthy as possible.</p> <p>Since after school activities are voluntarily sponsored by teachers, this may impact what clubs and activities are available.</p> <p>All participants in any after school club or extracurricular activity MUST be registered for ASP.</p>
What if I start my child off online (SBDL) and then return to school when Covid is better contained? How will that actually look for the children returning?	<p>School Based Digital learning will be a 9 week commitment. Many may be asking why is this a 9 week commitment? 9 weeks is the end of a grading period and from a personnel perspective, we can plan accordingly when we know how many plan to return after 9 weeks so we can be prepared for both the traditional model and School Based Digital Learning model.</p> <p>Prior to the 9 week period, if COVID is still a concern, someone from the school will contact parents to see if they want to continue digital learning or if they want to return to school.</p> <p>If they want to continue with digital learning, they will continue for 9 more weeks (again, this is only if COVID is still a concern in Douglas County)</p> <p>If they want to return they will be placed in a homeroom and return to a traditional learning setting at the school on the first day of a new grading period. Because the skills being taught during digital learning will mirror what is being taught in the traditional setting, the students should have a rather smooth transition back into the regular setting.</p> <p>The option of Digital Learning will phase out when public health agencies determine that COVID-19 is no longer a major concern for the community.</p>
Will speech and SPED services be provided online?	Yes. However, before that can occur, there has to be an IEP meeting where parents and the district agree on how that will occur to meet the needs of the child.
What about students without internet service?	The district is looking into that concern. Internet service is important for your child if you select SBDL – The district is working with a company to provide hotspots. The district hopes to have that in place by the start of school. If you select SBDL, it is important that you have internet capability.
How often are live sessions held with school based digital learning?	Students will have ELA (this includes reading and writing), Math, Science and Social Studies 5 days a week. The work assigned will mirror what the students participating in traditional learning are required to complete. Most work will be assigned through Google Classroom. Classes will last 45-60 minutes each.
What if parents get overwhelmed with digital learning? How can they get help?	If parents are overwhelmed, they can send an email to their child's teacher. Keep in mind that our teachers will be teaching both digital and traditional students, so they will have students all day long and if a child has a digital class at 7:40 - 8:25 for reading, that reading teacher will be leaving the class at 8:25 to go teach the students that are at school for traditional learning. This means the reading teacher might not be available to respond back to questions until 2:40 once they send the traditional students home or even the next day depending on what afternoon meetings they have scheduled. Our policy is that when parents contact us, they should get a response within 24 hours (unless it is a weekend or holiday).
Will some paper-based options be available for School Based Digital Learning?	<p>Most of the work for School Based Digital Learning will be housed in Google Classroom and live sessions through Google Meet. If paper copies are needed, arrangements will need to be made with the teacher.</p> <p>For Grades K-2 it is very possible that paper copies will</p>

Will option 2 be available all year long?	As long as COVID is here, the county plans to offer the digital option. If a vaccine comes out; the option of digital learning will continue. It will not stop unless parents and principals agree.
What if students doing digital learning have a doctor's appointment?	If students have an appointment and can't log in, it would be just like they were checked out for school (or absent if they miss instruction all day). The SBDL model will be similar to a regular school day, just at home with scheduled times to tune in for live lessons. During the live lessons, it would be like the student sitting in the room, except through Google Meetings, they would type questions in the chat box for their teacher or follow the protocol the teacher sets for questions. For example, cameras would be required to be on during class and they might raise their hand, just like in a regular classroom setting.
Can my child do their work later in the day because I have to go to work and can help them in the evening?	<p>In order to be in attendance, students will need to be in class when the class is scheduled. The workload for School Based Digital Learning will not look like it did March - May. This option requires students to attend class just like our traditional students, they are just attending from home and not at the school. The School Based Digital model at North Douglas allows class to occur at home between the hours of 7:40 - 2:40. Natural breaks will be built in for your child to have their own lunch, recess, and movement opportunities just like they would if they were at school. They will not be in front of a computer all day; however, they will be in front of a computer more than those that are attending through the traditional model. The live lessons will occur between the hours of 7:40 - 2:40. Independent work can be completed in the evening, but the live teaching lessons where the teacher is available cannot occur after hours. If you are helping your child with their independent work in the evening and you have questions, our teachers will be required to contact you within 24 hours. Our teacher's work day begins at 6:55 and ends at 2:55.</p> <p>Here is an EXAMPLE of what a schedule COULD look like:</p> <p>7:40am - 8:25am Science/social studies 9:00 - 9:45 - ESOL/ELL services 10:00am - 10:45am Math 11:15am - 12:00pm Reading/ELA 1:40pm - 2:25pm PE/Health</p> <p>Once parents see their child's class schedule, they can determine when they let their child have lunch at home and when they schedule their child's recess/etc. If students need help from their teachers, they will be able to get help during their regular scheduled time in class (just like they would if they were sitting in the classroom at school.)</p>
What will the grading policy be?	The grading policy is the same for all 3 models.
If we start off with one model, but want to change the model of learning, can we change?	<p>At NDES the SBDL is a 9 week commitment because we have to make staffing arrangements to accommodate the model.</p> <p>If you select the traditional model and suddenly feel like you feel more safe being at home participating in school based digital learning, please contact the principal to discuss options.</p>
What supplies will be needed for students who select School Based Digital Learning?	<p>Chromebook (supplied by the school - we will have a day these can be checked out)</p> <p>Internet capability at home or from the location you plan to attend from each day.</p> <p>Basic items your child might need during class, such as paper, pencil, highlighters, markers, crayons, glue sticks, scissors (sometimes teachers might send papers to your child or assign projects). MOST assignments will be on-line.</p>
How often are the air filters changed/cleaned in the building/classroom?	We are currently investigating this. This is a question that I've sent to the maintenance department.
How can parents help?	<p>We first ask that parents and guardians remain flexible with us. Information is ever-changing and we are working as fast as we can to ensure we continue to offer our students the best education while making sure our students are safe. We ask that parents make sure they talk with their child about being respectful of one another's space and personal items. We know it is possible that some students will wear masks and some will not. We ask that our families talk with their child about how many individuals have differing personal views on face masks, the school system is not requiring students to wear them or not to wear them. This is a decision made by the parents'.</p> <p>We do ask that parents help by providing their child with their own supplies, facial coverings, hand sanitizer, and any disinfectant wipe or spray. The school will purchase additional hand sanitizer for every classroom and ensure that we have soap in our bathrooms. The more disinfectant and sanitation materials we have the more we can do. .</p>
Will North Douglas Elementary have a dedicated teacher who just focuses on digital or will they be	Right now, it appears that our teachers will have to teach both traditional classes and virtual classes. Once we know how many students will return to school and how many are on-line, we will be able to

teaching both in person and digital students at the same time.	build our schedule.
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What is the difference between FLEX and School Based Digital Learning at NDES?

- Right now, the plans are listed below. Please remember that depending on the number of students who select traditional learning and School Based Digital Learning will drive the way the model looks. This chart will share the plan right now, but it could change as we learn more about the models families select.
- You may wonder WHY is it so hard to tell you how the models will look until after we know numbers for each option. At NDES, we have four-five teachers per grade level. Depending on how many students show up for traditional learning, we may not be able to devote one teacher per grade level to only teach digital classes. The probability of our teachers having to teach both digitally and traditional students is highly possible and most likely what will have to happen at North Douglas. We are a small school, with a small staff and additional staff will not be given to schools to accommodate the different models. We have to use the number of teachers allotted at our school.

The FLEX academy principal would need to be asked how instruction will look at the FLEX academy.		Students will be given a schedule and will tune into live lessons. For example, your child might have math 8:00 - 8:45 and their next class might be ELA from 10:00 - 10:45. Science/Social Studies might be 11:00 - 11:45 and PE 1:00 - 1:45. When students are not tuned in for class with their teacher, parents can set up breaks for their child, provide recess time, and lunch. Students will have due dates for assignments.
	There will not be a special meal distribution site set up for students in the FLEX and SBDL.	
Students in FLEX can begin participating in extracurricular activities in December.		Students participating in SBDL can participate in extracurricular activities at NDES when they are offered. Anyone participating in an after school extracurricular activity at NDESE must be enrolled in the ASP program.
		SBDL students will be allowed to participate in ASP. Parents can bring them at 3:00. Normal fees apply (\$10.00 registration fee and 8.00 per day). The process for checking your child in and out will be shared in early August.

		For SBDL, students will have to tune in during class time in order to be counted present and in order to receive the live instruction from the teacher. When we have assessments of learning, in order for the assessment to be monitored students will have to be present in the online class, with cameras on while completing the assessment.
