Education Even On The Coldest Days: Ways to keep your student engaged and learning over Winter Break

Winter break is coming and the one thing on every parent's mind is.... What will I do with my child for 2 whole weeks? Breaks can still be learning opportunities for students just as a typical school day would be for them. There are a number of different educational activities that students can do to stay engaged and occupied while sitting at home over the break.

Read, Read! Reading is what drives learning for students. Over the holiday season, students can read in many different ways to help strengthen their fluency, word recognition, retelling skills, and much more. Here are some ideas to make reading fun over the holidays: Let kids choose their own books and then talk about the books you're reading together, give a book as a present, read anything (Christmas cards) and read anywhere; read in bed, read by the fire, have a living room picnic, read books & sip hot chocolate, if traveling, take books with you, write THANK-YOU notes and have students read them back to you before mailing them, play family games that require reading like Apples to Apples or Boggle, What's Gnu?, Bananagrams, and Scattegories or read books on the App EPIC, on MyOn, or on a Kindle. All of these are excellent ways to get students reading and learning all at the same time.

Want to incorporate math over the holidays? While present-wrapping is pretty much a holiday season staple, the activity can also help young children build math skills. Help your child measure each gift, then determine how much wrapping paper will be needed to cover the present's surface area. Kids can measure and cut out the appropriate amount of wrapping paper, as well as any decorative elements, like ribbon. Not only will your child solidify their mathematical thinking, but you'll have your very own elf to help wrap presents. You could also get your student in the kitchen and have them measure out ingredients and help you bake those delicious holiday treats! Their love for math will grow as well as give you an opportunity to spend quality time with your child!

We can't forget science!! There's no better way to explore engineering principles than to start building! Gather up any number of household objects—plastic cups, popsicle sticks, LEGO blocks, straws—and start building. Encourage your child to record the height, shape, and size of each new creation, and then test the structure's ability to stand up against a younger sibling. If you're like me and want some suggestions for what to build and how to build it, Google is your best friend. The web is full of tutorials like a DIY light-up holiday sweater, or popsicle-stick truss bridge, or even a gingerbread house. Otherwise, find some funky materials, and let your child's creativity soar!

I began researching activities around the Metro Atlanta area, and do you know what I found....a host of family friendly, diverse and well-organized events. We had so much fun that I began inviting my daughter's school friends and we created some new traditions. Her friends would look forward to the events I would have on my "Family Break Calendar." The best thing about it is that it often cost only time (to research the events) and money for gas. On occasion, we would plan to eat at a nearby venue, but most of the time we would center our activities around snack bags or food available at the events and festivals. Our adventures also led me to take membership with many of the event venues and it has been like having a passport to ANYWHERE.

School Breaks are the perfect time to bring culture, adventure and travel to your family. "Breaking" on a budget is always a concern. Here are some tips to make your Holiday, Spring and Summer Breaks fun AND affordable!

- Perouse the internet by searching Convention and Visitor's sites. These often have events and activities for many of the Metro Atlanta counties.
- Check museums, the aquarium, movie theaters, show and sports venues. During the warmer months, many venues offer movies on the lawn and free movie viewings.
- Go directly to your town's event calendar.
- Look through the free publications that come in the mail or that you can pick up at many local stores.
- ° Venture on to researching some towns outside of the Metro Atlanta area.
- Talk to friends about some of the activities that they've participated in.

Your search will lead you to tons of family days, free preview days, free festivals, tastings, craft days and more. MANY of these events are FREE or within a reasonable budget. Some of the venues have free events for members. When creating your Family Break Calendar,

- Block off times that you know you will be unavailable. For example shopping or cooking times, visiting with out of town guests, hosting dinner or just general rest time.
- ° Spread your activities out along the break.
- Map your activities out and if two happen to be in a fair distance from each other or are related in theme or subject, plan those two on the same day.
- ° Make it fun for your kids by inviting a friend or two their age with you.
- Wear comfortable clothes and shoes.
- Have your camera phone ready for those memories.

You are your child's FIRST and most consistent teacher. All in all, you'll provide exposure and valuable learning experiences for your family. The holidays are a good time to enjoy small productions and shows at some of the smaller theaters. Along our journey, some of my most memorable adventures were trekking through China (when the Terra Cotta Warriors came to town), touring Italy (for a DaVinci exhibit), were moved by Mummies from Egypt, searched for souls at the Bodies Exhibit, and globe-trotted to Greece to soak in the Trojan Horse. We've also tried some different foods and traditions by attending different craft and cultural festivals.
